Inspire Shares personal stories from fellow ministry leaders about how God has worked in their lives

Two weeks from now is the second anniversary of the death of my sister-in-law. She and my brother had been married only a year when they discovered her leukemia. What they thought would be an easy treatment turned into grueling chemo sessions that failed to stop her cancer. She lasted only seven months after her diagnosis—the cancer was too strong and would not quit destroying her body.

I was in the room as my sister-in-law was passing away. It was a raw and awful time that I will never forget. As she struggled to let go, my mom and I sat and prayed with her. We spoke of the healing God brought her through the death of Jesus for her sins. We spoke of the peace He is able to offer when all around us is broken. We cried over the truth that God is victorious, but death has not yet quite lost its sting.

The Lord did not physically heal my sister-in-law. We grieved at her funeral and struggled through many dark days. But although God didn't heal her body, He healed her soul. She had accepted Christ and knew of the power of His resurrection. The sin that affects us all was wiped clean from her life by the cleansing power of the Holy Spirit. The Lord who heals brought new life to my sister-in-law, and one day we will see her again and rejoice with her. Together we will worship the Healer in glory.

Equip Offers perspective and context to the lesson's Bible passage

Peter plays a large role in the first half of Acts before Paul takes over the narrative. The first part of Acts 9 tells of Saul's (Paul's) conversion, and here we continue to see how the message of Jesus starts to spread to a wider region.

Peter goes to Lydda, northwest of Jerusalem, where he heals a man in Jesus' name, which causes many to believe. Meanwhile, Tabitha, a woman who helped the poor, becomes ill in Joppa. Joppa is a seaport on the coast of the Mediterranean Sea. Because it was closer to Jerusalem than Caesarea, it became a principal port for Israel.

Peter is called to Joppa when Tabitha dies, showing how the message of Jesus continues to move out from Jerusalem. Peter raises Tabitha from the dead in a way very similar to Jesus' raising of Jairus' daughter in Mark 5. When Jesus raised Jairus' daughter, He told the girl to rise: "Talitha koum!" (Mark 5:41). Here in Joppa, Peter raises Tabitha with "Tabitha, koum." The parallels here are not insignificant. Jesus passed on the powers He possessed to His followers through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

This miracle becomes known all over Joppa, and many start believing in Jesus. Because Joppa is a seaport, it's likely that the message of Jesus starts going out to sea and continues to spread the good news to the ends of the earth.

Support Provides reflection and assessment through encouragement, prayer, and time in God's Word

Throughout the Bible, God's prophets heal others in order to show His power. The ministry of Jesus continues this phenomenon, and then, after the coming of the Holy Spirit, Jesus' followers begin healing in His name. These very real physical healings that take place validate the power of Jesus. Have you ever known someone whom Jesus healed physically?

When these healings take place, God does much more than just heal one person. Those who hear of the miracle begin to believe, and God heals them spiritually. God changes hearts and transforms people's lives as they understand that Jesus is the One who came to save. When were you spiritually healed by the Father? The children in your group

come from all types of situations. Some face physical illnesses in their bodies or in their family members' bodies. Others are hurt emotionally or spiritually. The beautiful thing is that our Lord heals it all. He is the One who can bind up the brokenhearted as well as heal our physical wounds.

As you prepare to interact with your children this week, pray for them as specifically as possible. Pray for areas in their lives where you know they need healing and ask God to use you as His instrument in whatever way possible. Then, as you go through your time with the kids, be sensitive to those who may be broken and may need extra attention. Encourage them with the truth that our God heals and makes all things new.

CONNECT//10 minutes



Children develop relationships with their leaders and one another through simple activities and conversation starters.

Stories of Help

In this CONNECT time, kids will share stories about someone who needed help and how that person received what she needed.

RELATE

CONNECT QUESTION: welcome and greet children. open your time by asking this question: **What's the most amazing thing that's happened to you?**

It can be encouraging when we see someone else meeting a need through a small act of kindness, such as helping someone carry her groceries, or something big, such as a lifeguard saving someone's life. Invite your third and fourth graders to share stories about seeing someone who needed help and how someone else provided that help. For example, they could share when they saw a child lost in the store and saw how a cashier helped find the child's parent. Give each child an opportunity to share a story.

GATHER//30 minutes



Children experience and learn more about God through prayer, storytelling from The Big God Story, an investigation into God's Word, and creative ways to memorize Scripture.

Remember Verse

Each week children will spend time memorizing a portion of Scripture together. The Remember Verse focuses on a character trait of God that's highlighted in today's portion of The Big God Story.

Game: Draw the Verse

SUPPLIES

RELATE

Assign one word of the Remember Verse to each child. If you have a small group, assign two words to several of the children. Invite the kids to draw a picture or symbol to represent their word in the Remember Verse. Then put the pictures in order and tape them to a wall in your room. Have the children repeat the Remember Verse using the pictures they made. Say the verse together until the children know it well.

Storytelling

Bible Passage: Acts 9:36–42 Storytelling Technique: Objects

The Lord Who Heals

SUPPLIES

- Bibles
- Fabric (6 pieces, each approx. 5" x 8")
- Fabric marker
- Clothespins (6)
- Rope (about 4')

SET UP

Make a small "clothesline" by either tacking the rope from wall to wall or tying it to two chairs. Place the clothespins nearby.

RELATE

After Jesus went up to heaven, He sent the Holy Spirit to be with all who choose to trust and obey Him. Before He left, Jesus gave His disciples a very important job. What was it? Invite responses. Good thoughts. He told them to go and tell the world that He is the way to be with God forever. Many people heard the good news of Jesus and decided to put their faith in Him. Some even sacrificed their lives to make sure that the people of the world heard the truth about the Lord. Let's pray and ask the Holy Spirit to speak to our hearts today. Lead children in a Prayer of Release to pause, be still, and ask the Holy Spirit to quiet their hearts and minds.

The 12 apostles trusted Jesus as they continued to obey His words. God used the boldness of one of the disciples, Peter, to share the good news of Jesus with people far and wide. How did God use Peter to care for others and spread the good news? Interact with responses. Peter preached to a big crowd of people about how Jesus is the Messiah (Acts 2). Hold up a piece of fabric and ask kids to give you one word that describes how God used Peter in Acts 2. The word might be "preaching" or "sharing" or "boldness." Write the word on the fabric and pin it to one end of the clothesline.

One of the ways God showed that the disciples' message was true was by healing sick or injured people. God used the disciples to show that He loves people and that He is the Lord who heals. Peter also healed a crippled beggar in Jesus' name (Acts 3). Hold up another piece of fabric and ask for a word that describes Peter's care for others. The word might be "healing" or "helping." Write it on the fabric and pin it next to the other piece of fabric on the clothesline. Peter kept preaching about Jesus, no matter what, to anyone who would listen. He was even put in jail, but that didn't stop him from telling people the good news (Acts 3–4). Ask for another word to describe Peter's following God's plans for him to help others and write it on the fabric. The word might be "dedication" or "determination." Pin it to the clothesline.

Invite children to turn to Acts 9. Have a volunteer read vv. 36–37. In the city of Joppa lived a disciple named Tabitha who had become very sick. The people with her felt very sad. Tabitha loved Jesus and showed this love to others by serving the poor. Ask for a word that represents Tabitha's gifts or how she cared for others, such as "service" or "caring," and add it to the clothesline. She also made clothes for people who didn't have any. Hold up another piece of fabric, write "clothing" on it, and add to clothesline. She became so ill that she could no longer care for others. Then one day, she died. Her friends washed her body and placed her in a bed so that they could prepare for the funeral. Remove the two pieces of fabric related to Tabitha from the clothesline.

Invite a volunteer to read vv. 38–39. Tabitha's friends knew that Peter was in a nearby town, so they sent two men to ask him to come to Joppa. When he arrived, Tabitha's friends brought him up to the room where they had put Tabitha's body. They showed Peter some of the clothing Tabitha had made for them. Run your hand across the pieces of fabric on the clothesline.

Ask a volunteer to read vv. 40–41. Peter knew the Lord who heals, so he asked everyone in the room to leave, and then he got down on his knees by Tabitha's bed and began to pray. Write "prayer" on a piece of fabric and add to clothesline. He turned toward Tabitha's body, and then he said, "Tabitha, get up" (Acts 9:40). Suddenly, Tabitha opened her eyes and sat up in bed! God had raised Tabitha from the dead! Peter took Tabitha's hand and helped her get up. He called for her friends and showed them what God had done. The Lord heals! Tabitha was alive! Pin the two fabric pieces related to Tabitha back to the clothesline.

Invite a volunteer to read v. 42. This was the most amazing miracle anyone in Joppa had ever seen. People all over the town began talking about what God had done. Many people believed in Jesus because of this amazing miracle. God used His servants Peter and Tabitha to show His mighty power and to help people believe in Him.

In this part of The Big God Story, God showed that He is the Lord who heals. Through Peter, God did a great miracle that brought Tabitha back to life and helped more people know about Jesus. There is no sickness too great for God to heal! He has power over everything, and He is able to restore health and make people new. Share a personal story of how you or someone you know experienced the Lord who heals.

RESPOND//15 minutes



Children reflect on what the Holy Spirit is teaching them and respond to God through creative activities and games.

Praying for the Local Community

Students will be given time to pray for needs in their local area.

PREPARE AHEAD

Talk to your pastor or someone in your church who knows of those in the congregation who need prayer for healing.

RELATE

God is the Lord who heals! He holds the power to heal, and we can trust Him to care for us and those we love. God showed that He heals through the disciples. God shows other people who He is through us. Isn't that amazing? The Holy Spirit lives inside us like He lived inside the apostles, so we also have the power to pray for the sick! Who do you know who needs healing? Encourage answers.

Share with your children some of the current needs for healing that may exist in your church body or local community. When you're finished sharing, invite kids to spend some time praying for the people you shared and the people they shared.

(Optional) Clothes Race

Today lead your kids in a clothes race.

SUPPLIES

- Clothing (2 sets of items; large; e.g., shirts, sweaters, overalls, shorts)
- Timer

RELATE

It was wonderful hearing you pray for our community. Part of taking responsibility for what God has given us is noticing what's around us. Out of that, we can reach out to others. Tabitha was a kind woman who noticed the poor in Joppa, and she made clothes to give to those in need.

Divide your kids into two teams and have each team line up. When you say, "Go!" have the first child in each line put on all the items of clothing and then immediately take them all off and pass them to the next child in line. Then the next child must put all the items on, take them all off, and pass them to the next child. Continue until the last child puts all the articles on and takes them all off. The first team to complete the race wins.

If you have a smaller group, invite the kids to make one line, and time the group in putting the clothes on, taking them off, and passing them on to the next child. When the kids finish, you could have them repeat the game and see if they can beat their first time.

Developmentally Speaking

Third and fourth graders are both cooperative and competitive. After this game, affirm both teams for working hard to try to win the race.



Children receive a blessing from their leaders and sometimes one another. A blessing can be a prayer of commission, a portion of Scripture, or words to encourage and guide.

RELATE

Invite your children to sit together in a circle. Give each child a piece of fabric. Encourage the children to cup their hands in front of them and hold the fabric in their hands as you read the blessing from Jeremiah 30:17.

But I will restore you to health and heal your wounds.

May God care for your body, heart, and mind in every way. May He show Himself as the Lord who heals to you and those around you.

Then pass out the fabric markers for the children to write their own words or phrases of praise to God on their fabric. For example, they might write "Healer," "Loving," or "Sees Me." Then encourage the children to hand their piece of fabric to the child next to them as they bless that person by saying, "May God heal you in every way." Encourage the kids to take their pieces of fabric home to remind them to look for people God desires to heal.

Send home Remember Verse cards and the At Home Weekly with your kids.
