Inspire Shares personal stories from fellow ministry leaders about how God has worked in their lives

Several years ago, my church changed locations and bought a building in a new neighborhood. I started feeling God's tug on my heart to move closer to the church in order to minister better. The only thing was–I was living in my dream apartment. The spacious layout, the abundant windows, the breathtaking view–they were all perfect, but they were a long distance away from where God wanted me.

The call to move fit in with the larger picture of what God was doing in my life at the time—teaching me about surrender, sacrifice, and the freedom of living for Him rather than myself. I remember standing in my room in my apartment and saying, "Okay, God, I want what You want. Wherever You lead me, I'm all in." So, I packed up my belongings and followed God's lead. And you know what I have found? There is no better place to be than where God wants you. My old apartment was beautiful, but the relationships I formed by being able to live in close proximity to my church community were even more beautiful and rewarding.

Jesus is Master. Giving up our lives to follow Him can seem hard at first, but there is nothing more rich and satisfying than being where He is.

Equip Offers perspective and context to the lesson's Bible passage

Jesus is Master. We see this in Acts 18, where we read about a man and wife named Aquila and Priscilla. They were taken out of their comfort zone–forced to leave Rome and start over in Corinth.

It was AD 49. The Roman emperor Claudius had recently expelled all Jews from Rome. The Roman historian Suetonius noted this was in response to some disturbances "at the instigation of Chrestus" (a form of "Christ"). This probably referred to the opposition faced by Jewish Christians in Rome when they preached Christ as Messiah. So Priscilla and Aquila found themselves in Corinth.

After Priscilla and Aquila connected with Paul in Corinth and helped him found the church there, they traveled together to Ephesus. Paul then left the couple in Ephesus, where they encountered a powerful teacher named Apollos. Scripture says Apollos was "a learned man, with a thorough knowledge of the Scriptures" (Acts 18:24). However, his theological training was incomplete. He "taught about Jesus accurately" (v. 25) but apparently wasn't aware of the baptism of the Holy Spirit. So Priscilla and Aquila took him aside and taught him "the way of God more adequately" (v. 26).

In Acts 19, Paul encountered some disciples who had been instructed only about John's baptism—implying they had been taught by Apollos. Here we learn there were believers who had been exposed to the repentance called for by John the Baptist, and understood that Jesus was the Messiah, but hadn't learned of the giving of God's Spirit at Pentecost. Through both Apollos's teachable spirit and the gentle correction of Priscilla and Aquila, God corrected and inspired the believers in the early church. He led them to spread the good news of Jesus Christ, the Master of all.

Support Provides reflection and assessment through encouragement, prayer, and time in God's Word

Giving our lives over to Jesus can be one of the hardest processes we face as Christians—but also one of the most beautiful. When we live. When we lose, we gain. Read Matthew 16:25. Of what area in your life is Jesus asking to be Master? On what new paths is He leading you?

To prepare your heart this week, go to a place that's significant for you. Perhaps it's up on a roof with a view, under a

tree in your backyard, or in the quietness of your bedroom. There, journal or pray as you take time to process how Jesus is leading you. Afterward, if you're ready to make the commitment to follow His leading, consider standing and saying your declaration out loud, the way a husband and wife would speak their wedding vows out loud. Consider sharing your decision with a close friend or family member. However Jesus is leading you today, say yes. You won't want to miss what He has for you.

CONNECT//10 minutes



Children develop relationships with their leaders and one another through simple activities and conversation starters.

Going on a Trip

Your kids will have an opportunity to share what they would bring with them on a trip.

CONNECT QUESTION: Welcome and greet children. Open your time by asking this question: **What is the best trip** you've ever taken?

God called Paul to leave Corinth and follow Him to Ephesus. Paul's friends Priscilla and Aquila traveled to Ephesus with him.

Before taking a trip, it's important to pack and prepare. Today invite your first and second graders to share what they would bring with them on a trip. To make this activity creative, encourage each child to think of an item that begins with the first letter of her name. Then have her share her name and that item. For example, she might say, "My name is Amy, and I'm going on a trip and bringing applesauce." Make sure each child gets a chance to share what he would bring on a trip.

GATHER//30 minutes



Children experience and learn more about God through prayer, storytelling from The Big God Story, an investigation into God's Word, and creative ways to memorize Scripture.

Remember Verse

Game: Remember Verse Puzzle

PREPARE AHEAD

Prepare a Remember Verse puzzle for every three to four children by writing the verse on a piece of cardboard or poster board and cutting it into 20 to 25 pieces of various shapes and sizes. To make the puzzle more challenging, cut it into even more pieces.

RELATE

Invite children to assemble the puzzle to learn the Remember Verse. Split your class into groups of three or four and give each group one puzzle. The first group to put together the puzzle and recite the verse wins.

Storytelling

Bible Passage: Acts 18

Storytelling Technique: Interacting with Visuals

Jesus Is Master

SUPPLIES

PREPARE AHEAD

Print one copy of the Paul's Journeys map for each child. Cut out the words on the bottom of the map or have the children do it before you begin Storytelling. Test the fan to make sure it doesn't blow too forcefully. Read the activity instructions to see how you'll use the fan.

SET UP

Use two long pieces of tape to create a straight path—about 12 inches wide and six feet long—on the table. Place the fan at one end of the path.

RELATE

Invite a volunteer to help with the activity. **Thanks for helping me today!** Give the child a disposable straw and put the ping-pong ball at the end of the path opposite the fan. **I need you to blow through this straw and try to move this ball down the path to the other end of the table–all while keeping the ball inside the path. Ready?** When the child is ready, turn on the fan at the other end of the table so it's blowing gently against the child. **Go!** Have the child try to blow the ping-pong ball down the path a few times.

Okay, now let's try blowing from the other end, by the fan. Guide the child to the other end, just in front of the fan. Ask the kids: What do you think will happen? Invite responses. Good thoughts. Let's see! To volunteer: Ready? Go! Have the child blow the ball down the path with the help of the fan. That's a lot easier, isn't it? Thank the child and ask her to return to her seat. It was much easier for the ball to move down the path when it followed the wind from the fan. Just like the wind led the ball, God is always leading us. God is Master, and He's always at work. He directs us to follow Him wherever He may lead us. Before we move on with today's portion of The Big God Story, let's ask God to lead our time today. Lead children in a Prayer of Release to pause, be still, and ask the Holy Spirit to quiet their hearts and minds.

God led some people in the early church to follow Him with every part of their lives and tell others the good news about Jesus. There was Stephen, a man who wasn't afraid to tell others about Jesus. God also worked through Peter, whom God used to raise Tabitha from the dead. There was also Paul and Barnabas starting new churches and being chased out of many towns. Doing what God wants us to do can sometimes be difficult. But God wants to do important work within us and through us when He calls us to follow His path. Jesus is Master.

Today we're going to follow two people in The Big God Story—a married couple named Priscilla and Aquila. These people followed God because they knew He was their Master and they could trust His Holy Spirit to lead and guide them. Hand a map, pair of scissors, and glue stick to each child. As we talk about the different places mentioned in today's passage of Scripture, glue the different places to the map when we talk about them.

To begin, let's find Rome on your map. Have children glue the word "Rome" to the correct place on the map. Priscilla and Aquila lived in Rome. Have kids place "Priscilla and Aquila" over "Rome" but not glue them down. They were Jewish, and they made tents for a living. Unfortunately, the Roman emperor forced all of the Jewish people to leave Rome. So, Priscilla and Aquila moved to a town called Corinth. Go ahead and find Corinth on your map. Have children glue "Corinth" to map and move "Priscilla and Aquila" there.

In Corinth, Priscilla and Aquila met the apostle Paul, and they all made tents together. Paul also told everyone in Corinth that Jesus is the Messiah, the Savior the Jews had been waiting for. Have kids place "Paul" on map but not glue it down. Let's turn to Acts 18:1–5 in our Bibles. Read verses aloud as kids follow along.

Paul knew God wanted him to stay in Corinth for a while before going to more cities to tell people about Jesus. Read verses 9–10. After a year and a half, Paul followed God's leading and left Corinth and traveled to a town

called Ephesus. Priscilla and Aquila decided to move to Ephesus with Paul. They knew that God is Master and decided to follow His leading, even though it might not have been easy to move again.

Now find Ephesus on your maps. Have children glue "Ephesus" to map and move "Priscilla and Aquila" and "Paul" to Ephesus. In Ephesus, God used Priscilla and Aquila to tell others about Jesus. Priscilla and Aquila also helped a man named Apollos understand God's Word better. Why do you think we're not gluing their names to the map? Invite responses. Good thinking! These people were always ready to follow God wherever He might lead them.

God used Priscilla and Aquila in The Big God Story. They trusted in God as their Master and followed His leading, wherever it might take them. Just like the ping-pong ball went down the path more easily when it was guided by the wind, God wants us to follow Him in what He's doing. God has given us the Holy Spirit as a guide to help us, and as we follow His leading, He'll give us the strength to do what He calls us to do. Share a story about a time in your life when you followed God's leading.

Discussion Questions

- Why did Priscilla and Aquila have to leave their home in Rome? Acts 18:1-2
- How did Paul know it was okay to keep speaking about Jesus in Corinth? Acts 18:9–10
- How did God use Priscilla and Aquila in Ephesus? Acts 18:24–26
- How can you follow Jesus this week?

Developmentally Speaking

It's typical for first and second graders to ask "how" and "why" questions in response to what they read and observe. Do your best to listen carefully to their questions and provide honest answers. If you don't know, it's okay to say so and affirm the children for their willingness to step out and share their questions.

People in My Life

The kids will ponder if God wants them to encourage a specific person or tell a certain person about Jesus.

SUPPLIES

- People cutouts (see Resources)
- Scissors
- Pencils or pens
- Magazines (1 per child, age-appropriate)
- Glue sticks (1 per child)

PREPARE AHEAD

Print the People cutouts, making two "people" for each child, and cut them out.

RELATE

Paul and his friends Priscilla and Aquila obeyed God and followed Him, even though it meant moving away from their home and their friends. As they followed God and trusted Jesus with their lives, God helped them tell people about who He is. Read John 15:13–15. What were some ways Jesus revealed more about God to His followers? Invite responses. What are some ways we can show others who God is? Pause for answers.

God put Priscilla and Aquila in Apollos's life to tell him more about God. God also blesses us by putting people in our lives to help encourage us and support us as we step out in faith to follow Jesus. Invite children to spend a few moments thinking about the people God has uniquely placed in their lives—people who have influenced their spiritual journeys. What people taught you about God? Who showed you how to pray and how to read your Bible? Encourage responses. Give each child a People cutout and invite him to write the name of one of the people he just mentioned. Then point out the magazines and encourage the children to cut out pictures and words that represent the different ways the people in their lives show them more about God. Have them glue those pictures and words on their cutouts.

Just as these people encourage us in our faith, God wants us to encourage others to follow Him and trust Jesus as Master. Invite the kids to ask God if He might want them to encourage a specific person or tell a specific person

about Jesus. Then give each child another cutout and encourage her to write that person's name on this cutout. Finally, tape all of the cutouts—including the ones your kids worked on earlier—to a wall or door in your room.

(Optional) Three-Legged Race

Kids will compete in a three-legged race.

SUPPLIES

- Masking or painter's tape
- Bandanas or long scarves (1 for every 2 children)

SET UP

Using tape, mark the start and finish lines of the race.

RELATE

It's great that we can encourage one another to trust God as the Master of our lives. When God calls us to follow Him, we get to take part in what He's doing. Invite the children to come together and compete in a three-legged race. Pair up the kids and give each pair a bandana or scarf. Within each pair, have a leader tie one child's right leg to the other child's left leg. Then have all the pairs stand on the start line. On your signal, have the kids race to the finish line. The first pair to cross the line first wins the race! For a different twist on the race, turn the game into a relay race. Group the pairs into two teams and have the teams stand single-file at the start line. On your signal, the first pair must race to the finish line, race back, and tag the next pair, who will then continue the race. The first team to get every member back to the start line wins.



Children receive a blessing from their leaders and sometimes one another. A blessing can be a prayer of commission, a portion of Scripture, or words to encourage and guide.

SUPPLIES

RELATE

Gather your children into a circle with you and have everyone stand as you read 2 Corinthians 5:7:

We live by faith, not by sight.

Now model what it looks like for the children to bless one another. Do this by linking arms with the child next to you and saying, **May you live by faith and always follow Jesus.** Then have the child you just blessed link arms with the next child and repeat the blessing. Continue until all of the children have linked arms.

Invite kids to keep their arms linked as you (or another leader) pray a blessing over them from Ephesians 4:1:

Live a life worthy of the calling you have received.

As you read the last part of this blessing over your class, invite the kids to physically step forward as a way of symbolizing their willingness to take a step of faith into whatever God would have for them. Then end with these words:

May you serve Jesus and obey His leading. May you trust that He will guide you, protect you, deliver you, and care for you.
