Inspire Shares personal stories from fellow ministry leaders about how God has worked in their lives

A few months ago, I found out I was pregnant. This event was a bit of a surprise because it happened sooner than my husband and I expected. We were sitting together on our bed when we picked up the pregnancy test and saw the result together. Our response? Laughter. Not Sarah's laughter (Genesis 18:10–12), but laughter because we were surprised and stunned and a little overwhelmed. We laughed because there was nothing else to do.

This good news, though shocking at first, changed our lives. It began to affect all of our thoughts and conversations and interactions. This is news we began to share with those who were closest to us and eventually with everyone around us. This good news that lives inside of my belly cannot be hidden—it is obvious to all who look at me.

This, I think, is how the good news of the gospel should affect us. Jesus came to do what?! He paid my price? He offers me new life and a restored relationship with God? How can it be true?!

We should laugh in shock and then rejoice with overflowing praise. This good news about Jesus should be shared with those closest to us and with all who will listen. This good news should not—cannot—be hidden. It should pop out of us and be so visible in us that people ask us about it. Jesus changes us completely. He has rescued us. Good news, indeed.

Equip Offers perspective and context to the lesson's Bible passage

The core message of the New Testament is the important truth that Jesus is the Good News. He has made the way for us to be reconciled back to God. That is the message we all have been commissioned to share with the world through the words of Matthew 28:19–20. In fact, this mandate to spread the good news is the last thing Jesus told His disciples before He ascended back to heaven.

This command is called the Great Commission. But what is this command really saying? Every so often, the English translation doesn't quite carry the emphasis of the original Greek. This is one of those times. Much has been made, especially in missions literature, of the imperative command "go" at the beginning of verse 19. "Go into all the world" is the focus. So we are told from the pulpit to "go" spread the gospel. But in the Greek, the emphasis is a little different.

What is surprising is that "go" is not even an active verb in the Greek, let alone an imperative command. It is a participle, which helps us understand the actual verb a little better. The only active (imperative) verb in the sentence is in the phrase "make disciples." The terms "go," "baptizing them," and "teaching them" are all participles that explain the action of the verb. The tense of the participle "go" assumes action, and the next two participles describe the manner in which the verb is to be carried out.

So, verse 19 could be over-translated, "(Since you are) going (and as you go), *make disciples* ... baptizing them and teaching them." What does it mean to share with the world that Jesus is the Good News? It means to "make disciples." We are to tell people about Jesus, baptize them, and teach them to observe all that Jesus commanded.

The fact that Jesus has reconciled us to God, the truth that God invites us to be a part of His family, the amazing grace that shows us that God has been working since Genesis to restore the good that was there in the beginning—it's the greatest news the world has ever heard. Instead of making us furrow our brows and recite gloomy verses, it should

make our hearts leap with joy and our bodies dance in praise! Jesus is the Good News! He is the answer we've been looking for. God has been victorious, and He invites us into His kingdom! What emotions do you experience when you really stop to think about the good news that Jesus proclaims? Take a moment to read Luke 4:18–19. This is the good news Jesus came to proclaim—spiritual and physical freedom and salvation. The year of the Lord's favor! This week share this good news with someone who needs to hear it. And pray for your kids, that they would understand this good news, accept it, and share it with others.

CONNECT//10 minutes

Children develop relationships with their leaders and one another through simple activities and conversation starters.

Each child will say his name and something great that happened to him during the week.

CONNECT QUESTION: Welcome and greet children. Open your time by asking this question: What's the best news you've ever received?

It's great to hear all your stories; I love hearing about good news! Now we're going to do a fun activity that will help us learn more about each other. Let's start by sitting together in a circle. Choose a child to begin, and hand him the ball of yarn. He will say his name and something great that happened during the week. Then, while holding on to the end of the yarn, he will roll or pass the rest of the ball to another child in the circle. That child will also share her name and something great that happened, and then she'll hold on to the yarn while rolling the ball to another child. This will continue until each child has shared something about himself and a web has been created with the yarn.

GATHER//30 minutes



Children experience and learn more about God through prayer, storytelling from The Big God Story, an investigation into God's Word, and creative ways to memorize Scripture.

Remember Verse

Each week children will spend time memorizing a portion of Scripture together. The Remember Verse focuses on a character trait of God that's highlighted in today's portion of The Big God Story.

Game: Line It Up

Review the Remember Verse with the group a few times. Then have the children form a line. The child at the front of the line will say the first word of the verse and the child behind him will say the next. This will continue down the line until the entire verse has been said. If a child misses a word from the verse, the group must start again from the beginning of the line.

Storytelling

Bible Passage: Matthew 28:16–20 Storytelling Technique: Props and Pantomime Jesus Is the Good News

PREPARE AHEAD

Use the marker to draw a large arrow on each sheet of construction paper.

SET UP

Set the blocks in one area of the room. Put the blankets and pillows in another area of the room.

RELATE

All throughout The Big God Story we've been seeing how God has been at work to restore our relationship with Him. Why was our relationship with God broken? Invite responses. That's right! We've all chosen to disobey God and sin against Him. This separates us from God. But God promised to send the way for us to come back to Him. What was that way? Invite answers. Yes, Jesus! God sent His Son, Jesus, to die on the cross for our sins! Only Jesus could fix our relationship with God and invite us to be saved through Him. What good news— Jesus is the Good News! Let's take a moment to stop and thank God for sending Jesus as the Good News. Lead children in a Prayer of Release to pause, be still, and ask the Holy Spirit to quiet their hearts and minds.

Invite children to turn to Matthew 28 in their Bibles. After Jesus died on the cross for our sins, God raised Jesus from the dead three days later! Jesus showed that He is God by being raised to life. Then He began appearing to people so that they knew He had risen. What good news!

Jesus' disciples were in Jerusalem, where they had been when Jesus died. Invite kids to come to the pile of blocks and make a tower or a few small buildings to represent Jerusalem. But during the time Jesus taught people about God and healed them, Jesus and His disciples hadn't spent a lot of time in Jerusalem. Instead, He and His disciples had spent a lot of time in the area of Galilee. Read Matthew 28:16 aloud as kids follow along. Galilee had lots of small towns and lots of people whom Jesus talked to about God's kingdom. So, the disciples went back to Galilee, to the mountain Jesus had told them to go to. Lead kids to the blankets and pillows and encourage them to pile them up as high as they can to create a mountain. Then invite children to sit around the base of the mountain.

Jesus came to the mountain and met the disciples. What would you think if someone you knew was dead showed up in front of you? Invite kids to respond. Great thoughts! The disciples felt that way too. Read v. 17 aloud. Some of them worshipped Jesus. Have kids show you what it might have looked like when the disciples worshipped Jesus. But others could barely believe it—Jesus had been dead and now was alive! Those disciples doubted. Invite kids to show you what their doubtful faces might have looked like.

Jesus had taught the disciples a lot about God and His kingdom. Jesus knew that it was almost time for Him to go back to heaven, and the disciples had a big job ahead of them. Jesus had one last thing He wanted to teach them. Read v. 18. What does *authority* mean? Invite answers. Great thoughts. Having authority means you have power or control. Jesus has all authority because He is God. He knows all things, and He is the Good News!

Read v. 19 aloud as kids follow along. Jesus told His disciples to go make more disciples who would follow Him. He wanted them to go to every country so that everyone would know about Him. Give four different children an arrow. Invite them to tape them to the wall—one pointing up, one pointing right, one pointing left, and one pointing down. Jesus wanted His disciples to go everywhere—north, south, east, and west—to share that He is the Good News. Jesus wants all people to know that He can forgive their sins and fix their relationship with God. Jesus told His disciples to baptize people in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and to show them how to be His disciples.

Read v. 20. Part of being a disciple of Jesus is obeying Him. When we accept Jesus' gift of salvation, we believe He is the only One who can save us from our sins—He is the Good News! And we learn to walk in His way because it's the very best way to live. When we obey Jesus' commands, we're following Him and being His disciples. Invite one child to stand up as the leader. Have the rest of the kids follow him around the room as they walk

exactly as he walks and do exactly what he does until he sits down. That's what a disciple looks like! A disciple is someone who follows the leader. When we're disciples of Jesus, He is our leader, and we walk in His way and obey what He has told us in the Bible. Jesus didn't ask us to do this on our own. He says that He will be with us forever. Jesus sends us His Holy Spirit to help us follow Him. We can always ask the Holy Spirit to help us obey Jesus, and we know that God forgives us when we sin.

Jesus is the Good News! He came to bring us salvation, and He sends us to go share this good news with others. When we accept Jesus' gift of salvation, we can share it with anyone we know who needs to hear it. God loved us so much that He sent His Son to die for us and invite us to know Him. Jesus is the Good News! Share a time when you told someone the good news about Jesus.

- What did Jesus tell His disciples to do? Matthew 28:19–20
- Why is it important to share the good news about Jesus?

Great Commission Banner

Children will consider how God is calling them to share that Jesus is the Good News in their homes, schools, neighborhoods, and the world.

PREPARE AHEAD

Write "Jesus Is the Good News" in big letters on the butcher paper.

RELATE

Jesus is in charge of all things, and He told His disciples to go! He wants the whole world to know that He's the only One able to give us eternal life because He died and rose again.

Who shared the good news of Jesus with you? Invite responses. How can you share the good news of Jesus with others? Pause for answers. God has given each of us special gifts and abilities. We can tell others about Him in our own different ways according to these gifts. Invite children to ponder how they think God is calling them to share that Jesus is the Good News in their homes, schools, neighborhoods, and even their world. Then invite kids to draw pictures or write words on the banner to represent what God is saying to them today. When the children finish, hang the banner in the classroom as a reminder that Jesus is the Good News.

(Optional) Go

In this game kids follow instructions and do the actions called out after the word "Go!"


RELATE


When Jesus gave the Great Commission, He commanded His followers to go and make disciples. Today we're going to play a game during which you'll have to follow my instructions and do the action after I say the word, "Go!" For example, if I say, "Go, do 10 jumping jacks" you will do 10 jumping jacks. You will only do the action if I say, "Go" first, like in the game Simon Says. Start the game, and as you play, call out some commands without saying, "Go" first. Any child who does the action is out. The last child standing wins. Optional: Let the winner lead the

actions for the group in the next round of play. Ask: What is so good about following Jesus? Whom would you like to share the good news of Jesus with this week?

Developmentally Speaking

Children in this age group can perform a variety of different actions and movements. Use this game as an opportunity to challenge your kids by giving them fun movement patterns to imitate.





Children receive a blessing from their leaders and sometimes one another. A blessing can be a prayer of commission, a portion of Scripture, or words to encourage and guide.

RELATE

Invite your class to stand together as you read them the blessing from John 3:16:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

Then go to each child and bless her individually by saying: For God so loved (child's name) that He gave His Son, Jesus. Jesus is the Good News.

Finally, end with a blessing over the entire group.

May you celebrate that Jesus is the Good News, and may you share His love with others.
